Looking back, 2019 was a transformative year for Federation of Organizations. As the healthcare system transitions to a valuebased model and mental health becomes more integrated with primary care and addiction treatment services, we have been growing the agency in a new direction, seeking new opportunities with independent provider associations to form collaborative behavioral health networks. We continue to adapt and transform to a new system of providing care with the goal of achieving better outcomes for our clients while keeping costs down.



In 2019, we also laid the groundwork for the development of two affordable housing sites in New York City, which will allow us to provide more than 200 units of affordable and supportive housing for people in need.

As 2020 unfolds, we are rising to face an unprecedented public health crisis. I cannot say enough about the dedication of our front-line staff and their commitment to maintaining services and providing our clients with the support they need during this challenging time. ### HERKIMER GARDENS

Federation of Organizations is the sponsor and service provider for Herkimer Gardens, a 119-unit affordable housing complex under development in Brooklyn. Federation was selected for the assignment – which is part of a larger affordable housing initiative under the Vital



Brooklyn umbrella – by New York State Gov. Andrew M. Cuomo in late 2018. Over the past year, Federation has laid the groundwork for the mixed-use, senior development, which will have a strong focus on integrated supportive services. Of the 119 units, 59 will be occupied by frail elderly residents. Services will be focused primarily on the frail elderly, but they will be available to all residents. Hunger Free NYC, a partner on the initiative, will provide additional food assistance programs to the community. The building, which has been designed with an emphasis on efficiency and sustainability, will integrate green space with urban living and recreation.

### NAMEOKE DEVELOPMENT TO BRING 118 ADDITIONAL UNITS

Federation of Organizations has also moved forward with the Nameoke development in Far Rockaway, Queens. Permits have been filed for the nine-story residential building, which will have 118 units. The bulk of the units – 71 – will be designated as NYC 1515 OMH-supportive, service-enhanced apartments for formerly homeless individuals with severe mental illness. A total of 46 units will be targeted for individuals and families who meet income eligibility requirements. The remaining unit will be set aside for a superintendent.

### INTEGRATION OF CARE

Federation of Organizations received a \$112,500 grant from the Mother Cabrini Health Foundation in the foundation's inaugural round of charitable giving. Federation of Organizations, a large, multi-faceted, not-for-profit human service agency that has been helping people to help themselves for nearly 50 years, will use the grant to add the services of a physician assistant at its Wyandanch Mental Health Clinic in Wyandanch, a historically underserved, low-income area.

The physician assistant will work in concert with the behavioral health team to increase monitoring of chronic conditions for more than 200 individuals with behavioral health issues who are seen at the clinic.



# **CLINICAL SERVICES** DEPARTMENT

Federation of Organizations' Clinical Department served 1,535 individuals in 2019.

Federation of Organizations' Residential Services consists of both Licensed and Scattered Site Supportive Housing Programs throughout Suffolk, Nassau, Queens, Brooklyn and the Bronx. In 2019, there were over 875 beds. With an emphasis on the Housing First Model, individuals are accepted for services through a rapid entry process and are experiencing fewer barriers to housing. Once successfully housed, residents are able to focus their time and energy on their recovery and personal goals.

### SENIOR SUPPORT SERVICES

146 Foster Grandparent volunteers provided over 112,000 hours of one-to-one service valued at over \$1.5 million\* to 230 at-risk children (2,172 children in total) throughout Suffolk County at 59 schools, resulting in 99.6% of the children demonstrating improved academic engagement, and 99% showing improvement in their identified areas of need.

26 Senior Companion Volunteers provided over 28,000 hours of assistance valued at over \$390.000\* to 48 elders in Suffolk County to help them remain in their homes.

Suffolk County Respite Care Program provides caregivers with the opportunity to take time off from the stressors of caring for a frail, elderly family member. SCRCP provides approximately 35 families with 5,100 hours of service, valued at over \$71,000 per year, which helps avoid high cost-cost of institutional placement.







**Hours of Service** 



### HOME & COMMUNITY BASED SERVICES

98 individuals enrolled in Home and Community Based Services in 2019. These services are provided at the individual's home or at a community location where one is most comfortable.

In Suffolk County, over 461 mental health consumers were provided representative payee services to ensure their financial wellness and obtain skills needed for future financial independence. 97% of the individuals served maintained housing and avoided homelessness and 85% avoided psychiatric hospitalization. The results of a recent survey indicated that 95% of those who responded reported the overall quality of their lives has improved as a direct result of Financial Management services.







### OUTREACH & ADVOCACY

Peer advocates in Suffolk reached out to over 2,302 people with mental illness, providing the support needed to remain independent in the community.

Over 770 people who were homeless or at risk of homelessness received housing, employment and peer services through our homeless outreach programs.



Our food pantry and soup kitchen in Suffolk County provided 17,775 meals to hungry individuals and families.



On Long Island and in New York City, over 2,100 people were supported in their recovery from mental illness and other chronic illnesses and linked to services and community resources.
